But then the day after that bill came, a couple of checks arrived in the mail. One check was for \$1,000 and the other check was for an amazing \$10,000. Yikes, again! Why do these things surprise us when we serve and worship a God who does awesomely surprising things? He does things like loving us so much that He sent His only Son into this world to be our Savior. He stretched out His arms willingly in love on the cross to offer the forgiveness of sins to all who would believe in Him. He was raised from the dead as His authority of power over all the things of this world that want us to question and doubt His authority. And His involvement with this load and these checks was one of those God-Blessed Moments. Praise His Holy name!

Another one of those God-blessed moments has come in the number of new volunteers, young and older, who have shown up to help sort and pack clothes, help load trucks and unload trailers, clean gutters, sweep floors, and do general maintenance. These are the folks who keep OGT moving forward. All I can say is, "Thank You!"

Another blessing from the Lord comes in the donations of furniture and household items. These

gifts are what make it possible for OGT to serve the people in our communities with items that give them a hand-up.
