Weekly Devotion

On the third day a wedding took place at Cana in Galilee. Jesus' mother was there, & Jesus & His disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine was gone, Jesus' mother said to Him, "They have no more wine." "Dear woman, why do you involve Me?" Jesus replied. "My time has not yet come." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever He tells you." Nearby stood six stone jars, the kind used by Jews for ceremonial washing, each holding from twenty to thirty gallons. Jesus said to the servants, "Fill the jars with water;" so they filled them to the brim. They did so. & the master of the banquet tasted the water that had been turned into wine.

He did not realize where it had come from, though the servants who had drawn the water knew. Then he called the bridegroom aside & said, "Everyone brings out the choice wine first & then the cheaper wine after the quests have had too much to drink; but you have saved the best till now." (John 2:1-10)

The First Miracle: Jesus' first miracle is described in today's Scripture reading. There are some amazing things about this miracle. First, He performed this miracle in Cana, not Nazareth. Was it already apparent to Him that His friends & neighbors in His hometown would reject Him as the Messiah? Secondly, His mother must have known that He had the power to perform miracles. Why else would she say to Him, "They have no more wine." I think this was more than just a statement of fact. Thirdly, Jesus said to Mary, "My time is not yet come." Did He perform this miracle anyway, out of respect for His mother?

And Jesus turned water into wine! This might be hard to accept by those who teach that any use of alcohol is wrong. Not only did Jesus turn the water into wine, He turned it into "choice wine."

Jesus didn't take any public credit for this miracle, "though the servants who had drawn the water knew." And "He thus revealed His glory, & His disciples put their faith in Him." (John 2:11b)

One last thing. Jesus still offers us "choice wine" today. That would be the "choice wine" offered to us in the Sacrament of the Altar, where we receive His body & blood in, with, & under the bread & wine.

Prayer Prompts: Praise Jesus, for He is a God of miracles, who still comes to us today in the miracle of the Lord's Supper.
