Steadfast Crew of Volunteers




deal of sorting and packing while they were there. Thank you ladies, for volunteering at Orphan Grain Train – Iowa West and making this your service project. You are a blessing to many!

Weekly Devotion

When Moses went and told the people all the Lord's words and laws, they responded with one voice, "Everything the Lord has said we will do." Moses then wrote down everything the Lord had said. He got up early the next morning and built an altar at the foot of the mountain and set up twelve stone pillars

representing the twelve tribes of Israel. Then he sent young Israelite men, and they offered burnt offerings and sacrificed young bulls as fellowship offerings to the Lord. Moses took half of the blood and put it in bowls, and the other half he sprinkled on the altar. Then he took the Book of the Covenant and read it to the people. They responded, "We will do everything the Lord has said: we will obey." Moses then took the blood, sprinkled it on the people and said, "This is the blood of the covenant that the Lord has made with you in accordance with all these words." Exodus 24:3-8

"Everything the Lord has said we will do."

Some years ago, I heard a startling statistic. After confirmation, half of the confirmands cease going to church. By their early twenties, another half stop attending church. That means that 75% of all confirmands—who have professed their faith publicly—are no longer active in Word and Sacrament and worship before they even turn 30!

Before we get too judgmental, let's remember that even though we may confess, "Everything the Lord has said we will do," we still live in a world filled with temptation: constant assaults by the devil, the world, and our own sinful flesh. It's all too easy to lapse in our commitment to the Lord. The children of Israel avowed, "Everything the Lord has said we will do." Sadly, we know how that worked out for them. Sometimes that's how it works for us, too.

On our own, we cannot hope to know the true God and follow His will for our lives. But just as "Moses went and told the people all the Lord's words and laws," and just as Moses "took the Book of the Covenant and read it to the people," we, too, are given the opportunity to abide in God's Word.

We do this through our own personal devotions, Bible reading, prayer, and regular worship. God's grace is promised to us, and He gives us the power of the Holy Spirit to remain faithful to Him.

"Give thanks to the Lord, for He is good, His love endures forever . . . to the One who remembered us in our low estate, His love endures forever; And freed us from our enemies, His love endures forever . . . Give thanks to the God of heaven. His love endures forever." Amen.
