OGT Continues Aid after Hurricane Helene of 2024





Hurricane Helene caused widespread destruction in North Carolina and other states in September of 2024. Since then, Orphan Grain Train sent many shipments of food and aid including a 28-bed sleeping trailer delivered by OGT Logistics in September of 2025 for volunteers assisting the area with rebuilding. OGT Logistics CDL Driver, Bob Schleppenbach, delivered a second bedroom unit to Burnsville, N.C on January 13, 2026. This container has 16 beds with smaller individual rooms. Mary Bates, North American Lutheran Church's Disaster Response Director is currently in Yancey County coordinating the rebuilding of 6,000 homes destroyed by the September 2024 Hurricane Helene. Bates arrived

in the area a few days after the hurricane hit. Her crew of volunteers has completed over 100 homes and eight new buildings. They continue to seek volunteers to join in the rebuilding process. Housing, materials and tools are provided. If you would like to be a part of the rebuilding of the disaster affected areas, please contact Mary Bates at (740)-509-1132.

Orphan Grain Train Wisconsin received word that the container they sent to Lithuania arrived at its destination. The recipients, Jurbarkas Evangelical Lutheran Diaconia's "Jurbarko sandora", will provide support to the Jurbarkas Women's Crisis Center. The Center assists women who are facing difficult life circumstances. Support will also be given to parishioners and children's day care centers in Skirsnemune, Smalininkai, Vilkyskiai and Garliava. Men's, women's and children's clothing, blankets, sleeping bags and mats were packed into the load. Sixty-two chairs, medical equipment and supplies and ten bicycles were also included in the container. We rejoice when we hear a sent container has been

delivered and received. Thank you, donors and volunteers for all that you do in making these shipments happen.


Do you recognize this quilt?

Weekly Devotion

On the third day a wedding took place at Cana in Galilee. Jesus' mother was there, and Jesus and His disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine was gone, Jesus' mother said to Him, "They have no more wine." "Dear woman, why do you involve Me?" Jesus replied. "My time has not yet come." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever He tells you." Nearby stood six stone water jars, the kind used by the Jews for ceremonial washing, each holding from twenty to thirty gallons. Jesus said to the servants, "Fill the jars with water;" so they filled them to the brim. Then He told them, "Now draw some out and take it to the master of the banquet." They did so, and the master of the banquet tasted the water that had been turned into wine. He did not realize where it had come from, though the servants who had drawn the water knew. Then he called the bridegroom aside and said, "Everyone brings out the choice

wine first and then the cheaper wine after the guests have had too much to drink; but you have saved the best till now.” This, the first of His miraculous signs, Jesus performed at Cana in Galilee. He thus revealed His glory, and His disciples put their faith in Him. (John 2:1-11)

Wine: Have you ever visited a winery for a wine-tasting? Lois and I visited the Prairie Rose Winery in Keystone, SD, and sampled their wine. We bought a bottle of Pumpkin Bog wine, fermented from pumpkins and other ingredients. I don’t consider myself to be a wine-connoisseur, but I know what I like.

What was the significance of Jesus’ first public miracle? One source I found among many noted, “Changing water into wine requires demonstrating power over time and space. Wine requires many processes that cover a long period of time. The growth of the plant. The maturation of the grape. Harvesting the grape. Treading the grapes into juice. Great wine takes a long time to ferment. Jesus bypassed the entire timeframe in moments, which only God can do.” [Source: Danielle Bernock, christianity.com]

There may have been many reasons why Jesus chose to turn water into wine for His first public miracle. Whatever the reason, Jesus showed that He is Lord and master of all things. He alone can transform water into wine. He alone can give us His body and blood in, with, and under the bread and wine of Holy Communion.

O Lord, “continue Your love to those who know You, Your righteousness to the upright in heart.” (Psalm 36:10) Amen.
